



This year, we hosted 4 weeks of Road Scholar programs on South Bass & Kelleys Island! Birders came to the islands from all over the U.S.










wild edible plants, and how insects' vision differs from ours.



Visitors helped build a bug hotel for insects to seek shelter using what they could find in nature (pinecones, leaves, sticks, etc.) and recycled materials found around the house




(toilet paper rolls, bottles, string, etc.).

MBI MUSIC FEST - NATURE ART

At the Middle Bass Music Fest, the Nature Center prepared an art activity where visitors created their own collages using reclaimed materials. The activity featured paints from a company that extracts iron oxide pollution from Ohio waterways and uses that pollution to produce paint pigments. The collages were also made using invasive plant species.



GEOLOGY WALK

The walk was held at Cooper's Woods where we discussed Ohio's natural and geological history starting at the formation of Earth. Participants also got a close-up look at extinct plant and animal fossils found in Ohio.

LIVE ANIMAL PROGRAM

At South Bass Island State Park, the LEINWC

brought our ambassador animals (fox snake, American toad, and box turtle) and animal artifacts (furs, skins, shells) for visitor interaction.



REUSABLE BAG MAKING

A reusable-bag making activity was held at South Bass Island State Park where visitors



learned how to make their own bags from recycled t-shirts in hopes to reduce the amount of single-use plastic used in their everyday lives.



MICROCLIMATES AND FRUIT BELT WALK



On Wednesday August 9th, we held our 11th annual Pig Roast. This event is one of our biggest fundraisers, and always a part of Island Green Week. With beautiful







while learning about Ohio's greatest water resource and visiting education stations to learn about island history, water quality, native plants and animals, and the dangers of plastic pollution. The Nature & Wildlife Center hosted a display on wildlife entanglement, run by Calen Campbell of

MONARCH TAGGING



MAMMALS ON SOUTH BASS ISLAND By Amy Alford




White-tailed Deer are ever present on South Bass Island. The Nature Center will have two opportunities this winter for Island residents to monitor and report deer on their property. First, the Nature Center has numerous trail cameras to loan and hope to have cameras monitoring any deer movement on ice this winter. Second, we have a simple deer pellet survey to estimate deer activity on the Islands. So, if

you are interested in borrowing a camera (or have a trail camera already!) or counting deer poop this winter, contact Amy at leicommunityscience@gmail.com.

Many Island residents often ask "how many deer should South Bass Island have?" The carrying capacity, that is how many deer the Island can support, is dependent on numerous factors including food availability, predator occurrence, and Island residents' attitudes to having deer on their property. However, for a well-managed deer population with ample food resources, biologists suggest a density of about 15-30 deer per square mile and the average density of deer in Northwest Ohio is about 15 deer per square mile. The cur-

rent South Bass White-tailed Deer population seems to be at a normal population level.

In addition to estimating the White-tailed Deer population on South Bass Island, Juan also monitored bat activity with equipment from the Ohio Division of Wildlife. Bats use echolocation to feed and navigate the evening sky. While these calls are undetected by the human ear, ultrasonic microphones have been developed to record bat echolocation calls. We mounted these microphones at 8 locations. We then used a specialized

sound analysis program to tell us what species of bats were recorded. At least 5 of the 10 known bat species found in Ohio were on the islands this summer. Some bats like the Eastern Red Bat, Silver-haired Bat, and Hoary Bat are migratory and use the islands for rearing young during the summer. Others like the Big Brown Bat and Little Brown Bat are resident species that find winter hibernacula in caves and tree cavities. This is great news as it indicates the islands provide a variety of habitats for bats throughout their life cycle. Since bats are great at controlling insect pests, our islands benefit from their presence - a win-win for everyone!

Remember to never handle a bat. If you come in contact with a bat or have a bat in your house, contact your local health department or animal control agency for professional assistance.

POND UPDATE

We are still absolutely thrilled with the beautiful outdoor pond that was built by Aquascape Inc. last summer. We are happy to report that we aren't the only ones loving this wonderful water feature, we have witnessed a multitude

of wildlife using the pond throughout the year. We have seen deer drinking from it, found

baby Lake Erie watersnakes swimming in it, observed dragonflies laying eggs, spotted frogs jumping into the water, and beheld many species of birds bathing in the fresh flowing water. We actually had a lot of migratory birds stay and nest nearby, much more so than usual, and we are convinced it is because of the access to water (especially after the drought we had in May). Some of the nesting species observed were indigo buntings, black and white warblers, yellow warblers, common yellowthroat warblers, and cedar waxwings!


