

The two kayak tours were led by H2Ohio specialists and took place at Middle Bass Island and South






Bass Island State Parks. Participants were led around the shorelines of the two islands while learning about local plant and animal species seen throughout the trip.






## **12TH ANNUAL PIG ROAST**

### **DEER ON SOUTH BASS ISLAND** By Amy Alford

For the second summer, the Lake Erie Islands Nature and Wildlife Center mentored a Stone Lab Research Student to further understand the Whitetailed Deer population on South Bass Island. Eliza Rothenburger, a senior at Virginia Tech, evaluated both the population size of the deer as well as identified what plants they were eating this summer.

Thanks to numerous private landowners, the Lake Erie Islands Conservan-Two different bucks captured at cy, the Put-in-Bay Township Parks District and Stone Lab, we now have a network of game cameras across South Bass and Gibraltar Islands that have been monitoring the deer since Fall 2023. Eliza used the images captured from these cameras to see how the deer are distributed throughout the Island and to estimate the total number of deer. Last year, our Stone

> Lab student estimated about 48 deer to be living on South Bass Island. This year, Eliza estimated that there were somewhere between 30 - 48 deer living on the island. We are confident that the Island is home to no less than 30 deer, which includes around 17 bucks. This may sound like a lot, but it's similar to mainland population sizes that average 15-30 deer per square mile (South Bass is about 2.5 square miles). Remember, deer can travel over the ice and many bucks swim

between Islands in the fall to find mates, so population sizes will change from year to year.

Most importantly, Eliza found that during the summer, the Island provides enough food to sustain the deer population. She surveyed 8 properties on the Island to determine if deer were eating plants there and if so, what plants did they prefer to eat. Deer preferred native plants like False Solomon's Seal, Waterleaf, and Poison Ivy over non-native plants like Honeysuckle and English Ivy. But most importantly, Eliza found no evidence that deer eat the most invasive plant on the Island, Garlic Mustard. This is concerning because as Garlic Mustard takes over more of our native plant fauna, we might see food limitations for Whitetailed Deer. This highlights the importance of the work all of us have done to control Garlic Mustard on the Island.

During our short ice season in January this year, we had three does travel from South Bass Island to Gibraltar Island. This image is facing south with the OSU Staff housing (Gib House) seen in the foreground and the Miller Dock seen in the distance across the ice.

Many our Island residents may have noticed deer eating many ornamental plants on the properties, particularly in the later part of the summer going into fall. This is likely a result of the drought we've been experiencing. A landscaped lawn is also a well-watered lawn and well-watered plants likely supplemented the deer through the drought. But moving through the fall, deer now have other foods to eat again like acorns! White-tailed Deer have been part of the Island ecosystem for thousands of years. And while it may seem like their population has been growing these past few decades, there is no current reason to think there are too many. We should be proud to know that our Island has been able to provide a safe home to these wonderful animals. 
